eVisa Support

We are concerned that there are families who will need support in transitioning to eVisas. This is incredibly important as the current system of biometric residence permits expires on the 31st of December. Your families may need support in understanding and completing this process. Detailed guidance is available <u>here</u>. Families should sign up for eVisas at <u>gov.uk/eVisa</u>, and please strongly encourage parents and carers to create accounts for their children.



Your Holiday Hub

Your Holiday Hub is funded by the Department for Education's Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme. It offers **exciting**, **enriching activities and nutritious meals** for school-aged children eligible for

benefits-related free school meals during the school breaks. Children who aren't eligible for benefits-related free school meals can still join in the fun through Open Access sessions. If your child has special educational needs or disabilities (SEND), please contact the activity provider directly to discuss how they can best support your child's needs.

The Bristol Bike Project (BPP)

<u>The BBP</u> offers people seeking asylum or with refugee status and unable to work, the opportunity to get out on two wheels. They accept donations of bikes, and are always looking for volunteers. They have three schemes:

- <u>Earn-A-Bike</u> refurbish a donated bike, learn basic maintenance skills and the bike is then yours to cycle away
- <u>The Social Cycle</u> learn new bike maintenance skills, drink tea, chat and have fun, no previous experience required, Friday 10:30-1:30pm
- <u>After School Bikes</u> free, drop-in workshops for young people aged 8-18 yrs to learn how to fix their bike, Fridays 3-5:30pm




Staff Training

Supporting Refugees and Asylum-Seeking Pupils in Schools (SRASPS)

Bristol Schools of Sanctuary and the Bristol Attendance and Belonging team run termly SRASPS meetings. We aim to provide an opportunity for those working with sanctuary seekers to meet together and share the best possible support and current guidance. These meetings host speakers who can give expert advice. The next meeting will focus on how to support the mental health and wellbeing of sanctuary seeking pupils, we hope to have speakers from the ARC, the Haven and Off the Record.
